## "Look what we've achieved together"

More than 70 community groups from all corners of the Hastings and Camden Haven will gather at Wauchope Showground on October 22 to celebrate Hastings Co-op's centennary.

In a display of community spirit the region is renowned for, community groups, schools, clubs and interest groups will embrace the opportunity to showcase "what we've achieved together".

Hastings Co-op's chief executive officer Allan Gordon explained the 100 year Community Party is the highlight of centenary celebrations, all of which are designed to "thank our valued staff, shareholders, suppliers and customers for their support".

"The Community Party is all about good, old fashioned family," Mr Gordon said.

"As one of the longest-serving independent co-ops in Australia, we were originally established by a group of local dairy farmers who saw the benefits of joining forces so it's fitting that we mark 100 years in this way."

In addition to displays by local clubs and community groups, the Community Day program includes the monthly Wauchope Farmers Markets, annual Rotary Book Sale, a petting farm, lawn mower racing, kids rides and entertainment, local bands, a cooking demonstration by Outlier Cafe, miniature railway, vintage and hot rod car displays and a 2WAY FM live outdoor broadcast to name a few.

Festivities will kick off at 8am and include an official opening by Melinda Pavey and David Gillespie at 10am, a community tug-o-war challenge from 12pm and music and dance performances right through to 5pm. The long list of groups flying their flag at the event includes emergency services, schools, charities, dance studios, local wineries, businesses, service clubs, 4WD, gardening, scouts, craft, painting, historical, ukele, astronomy, miniature aircraft, soccer, hockey, cricket and netball clubs.

"We have been overwhelmed by the number of groups coming and warmly welcome everyone to come along, as this is our way of saying thank you," Mr Gordon said.

"Over the past 100 years we've grown from strength to strength, both in size and diversity, however, we've never lost sight of the importance of the local community.

"We have done a lot over 100 years and with the community's continued support and loyalty, our children, grand-children and their children, will be celebrating our sesquicentennial and bi-centennial anniversaries in no time at all."

Hastings Co-op began as a dairy factory in 1916 and has evolved into a diverse retailer which employs more than 270 people across six very distinct business divisions: fuel, supermarkets, bottle shops, department stores, hardware and rural supplies and a café.
