For homeowners, the loss of your lawn is not a pretty sight. For farmers, it reduces pasture production and can affect profitability.

Army grubs are normally dark green, smooth and hairless, with stripes along the side of their bodies.

During the course of a normal season they can have between one and six

generations and feed voraciously, attacking on various fronts like soldiers (hence the name), and often devastating large areas.

Army worms love new root shoots of turf or pasture and can do great damage. The only options for control is to do nothing and hope they will soon disappear or spray with an insecticide. It's important after treatment to rejuvenate your lawn, as the bare patches are perfect for weed generation. You should also look at fertilizing to encourage growth. Most farmers will delay autumn planting to avoid the possibility of complete loss of new pastures and
